



ELEANOR ROOSEVELT 1884-1962

First Lady Activist who created a network of advocacy during the Great Depression and World War II. Eleanor broke rank with White House tradition and became the first woman to use her office as a bully pulpit for many causes to help the marginalized and underprivileged.

Her life is an example of what a One can accomplish when holding the tension between uncompromising strength of conviction together with patient kindness.

JALALADIN RUMI 1207-1273

The most widely read and translated poet in history, Rumi's work transcends ethnic and spiritual boundaries. A jurist and scholar by background, Rumi became a great Sufi saint following the death of a dear spiritual friend.

Rumi's life is a classic example of what is possible when the passion and anger of a One is turned inward – transforming disappointment and grief into the poetry of healing and beauty.

FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE 1820-1910

A celebrated English social reformer and the founder of modern nursing. She came to prominence during the Crimean War where she tended to wounded soldiers making rounds at night. She singlehandedly expanded the participation of women in the workforce of her day.

Florence is an icon of what can happen when the motivation of a healthy Two focuses on unselfish service for others without losing her own conviction and innate gifts.

CHIEF JOSEPH 1840-1903

Native American leader of the Nez Perce in northeastern Oregon, Chief Joseph led when his tribe was brutally removed from their ancestral lands. The way his tribe conducted themselves in the face of incredible adversity led to widespread admiration among military adversaries and the American public.

Chief Joseph is a model for healthy masculine Two energy that is willing to take on the role of caregiver for an entire tribe regardless of personal sacrifice.

DOROTHY DAY 1897-1980

Dorothy Day was a dynamic social activist who founded the Catholic Worker Movement organizing relentlessly against any form of social prejudice. Her convictions often got her into trouble with authority while she remained respectful and committed to the same institutions that she criticized.

Dorothy is a good example of healthy Three energy used for the sake of others rather than in support of her own agenda and ego. Much of her success was not acknowledged until after her death.

BILL W. 1895-1971

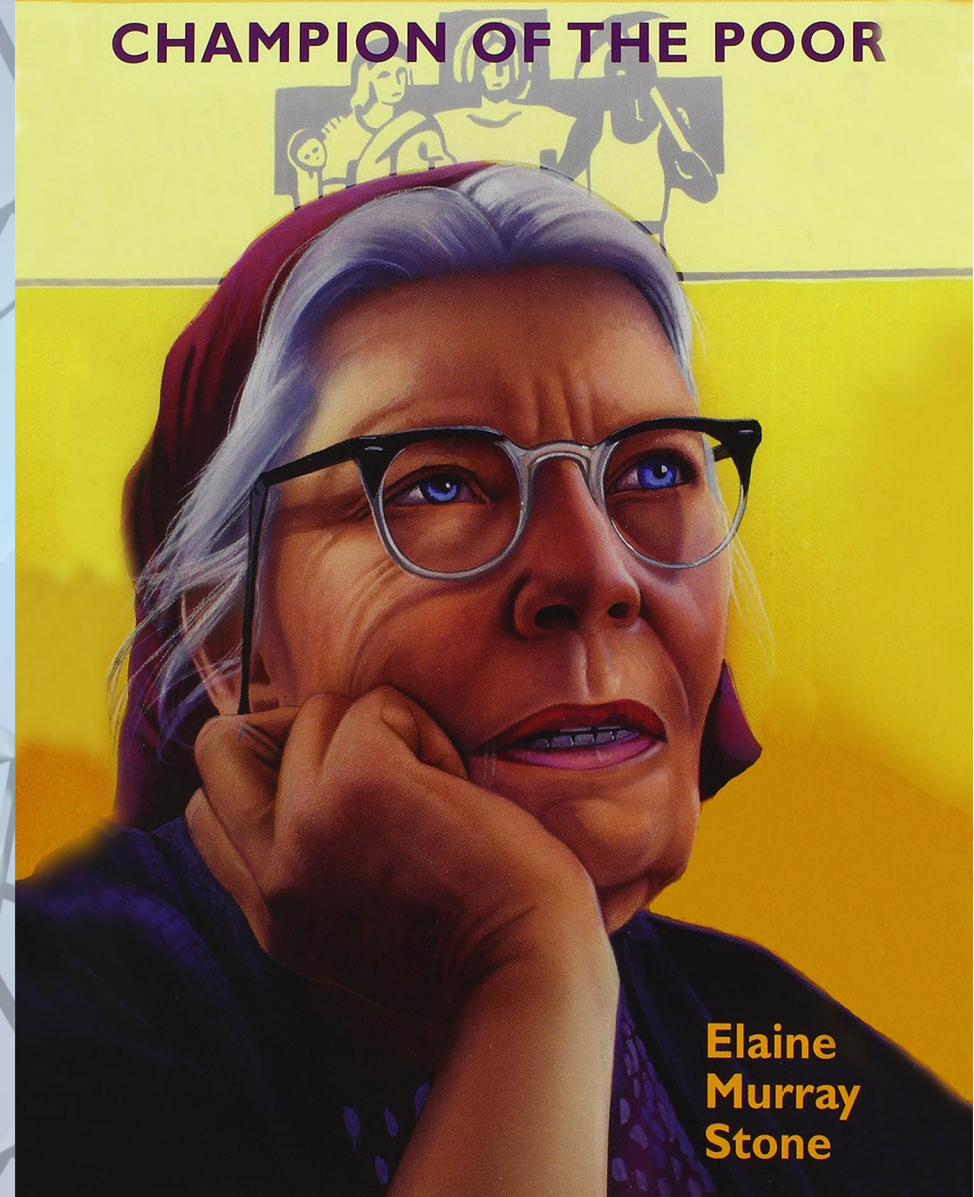
William Griffith Wilson (Bill W), was co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, an international fellowship with more than two million members helping alcoholics maintain sobriety. At the heart of his healing work was a conviction that Something/One higher than himself was needed for recovery.

Wilson exemplifies healthy Threeness by focusing his life's resources and energy towards rather than denying his own personal "failure." Time magazine called Bill: "A Great Healer" and one of The Most Important People of the Century.

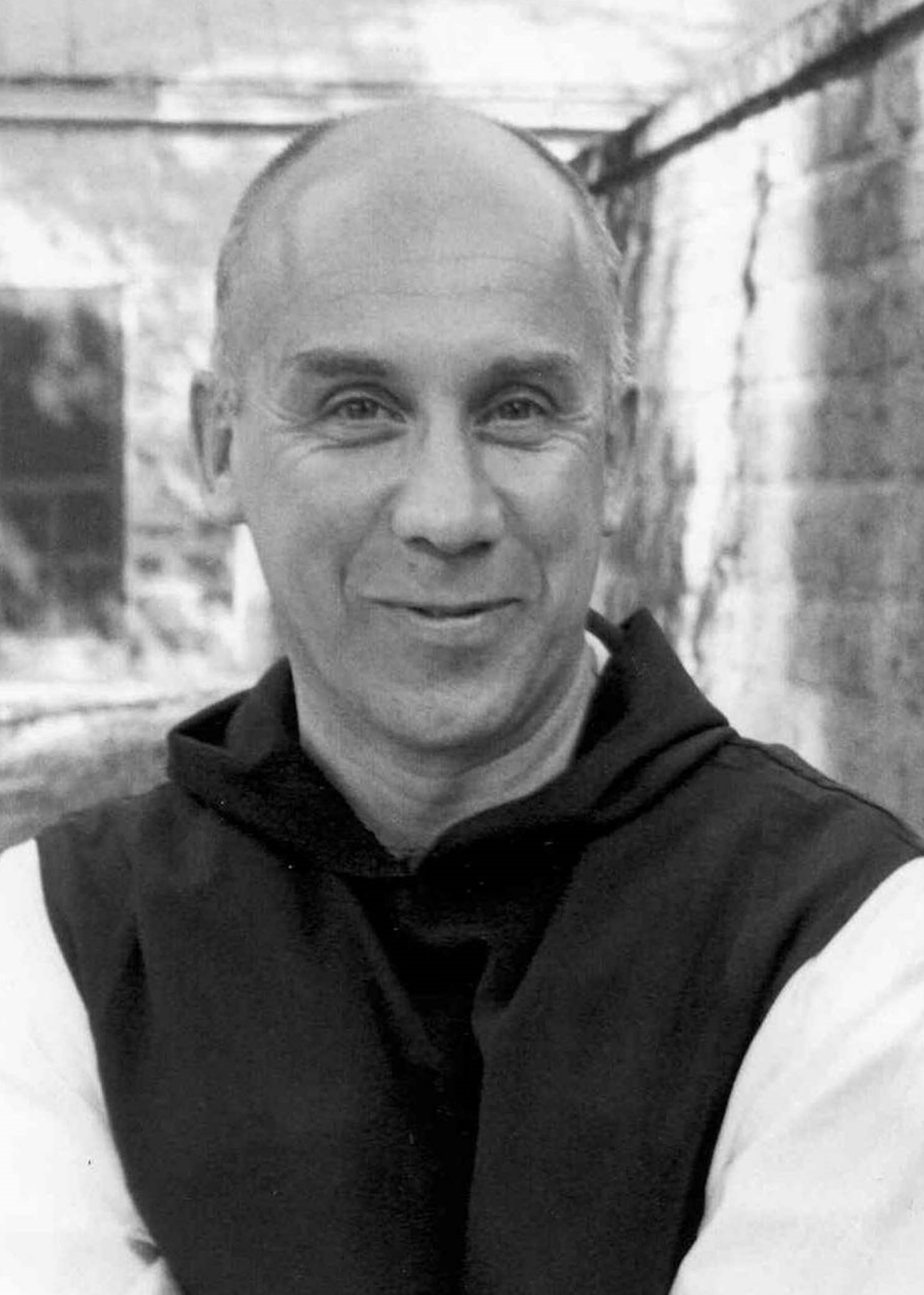

ANNE FRANK 1929-1945

Young Annelies is one of the most celebrated Jewish victims of the Holocaust. Her wartime journal *The Diary of a Young Girl* gained international fame posthumously after it was published and documents her experiences hiding during the Nazi occupation of Holland.

Anne illustrates the remarkable ability of a healthy Enneagram Four to deal with the unimaginable suffering of loss and war with grace, candor and interior strength.

THOMAS MERTON 1915-1968

An American Trappist monk and mystic, Merton was a social activist and an early keen proponent of interfaith dialogue. He pioneered dialogue with the Dalai Lama and the Vietnamese monk, Thich Nhat Hahn, and wrote more than seventy books mostly on spirituality, social justice and a quiet pacifism.

Merton is a widely respected contemporary American Mystic because he developed the Enneagram Four strength of gratitude and soulful equanimity in the face of his own personal emotional struggles.

"You cannot be both bitter and grateful at the same time."

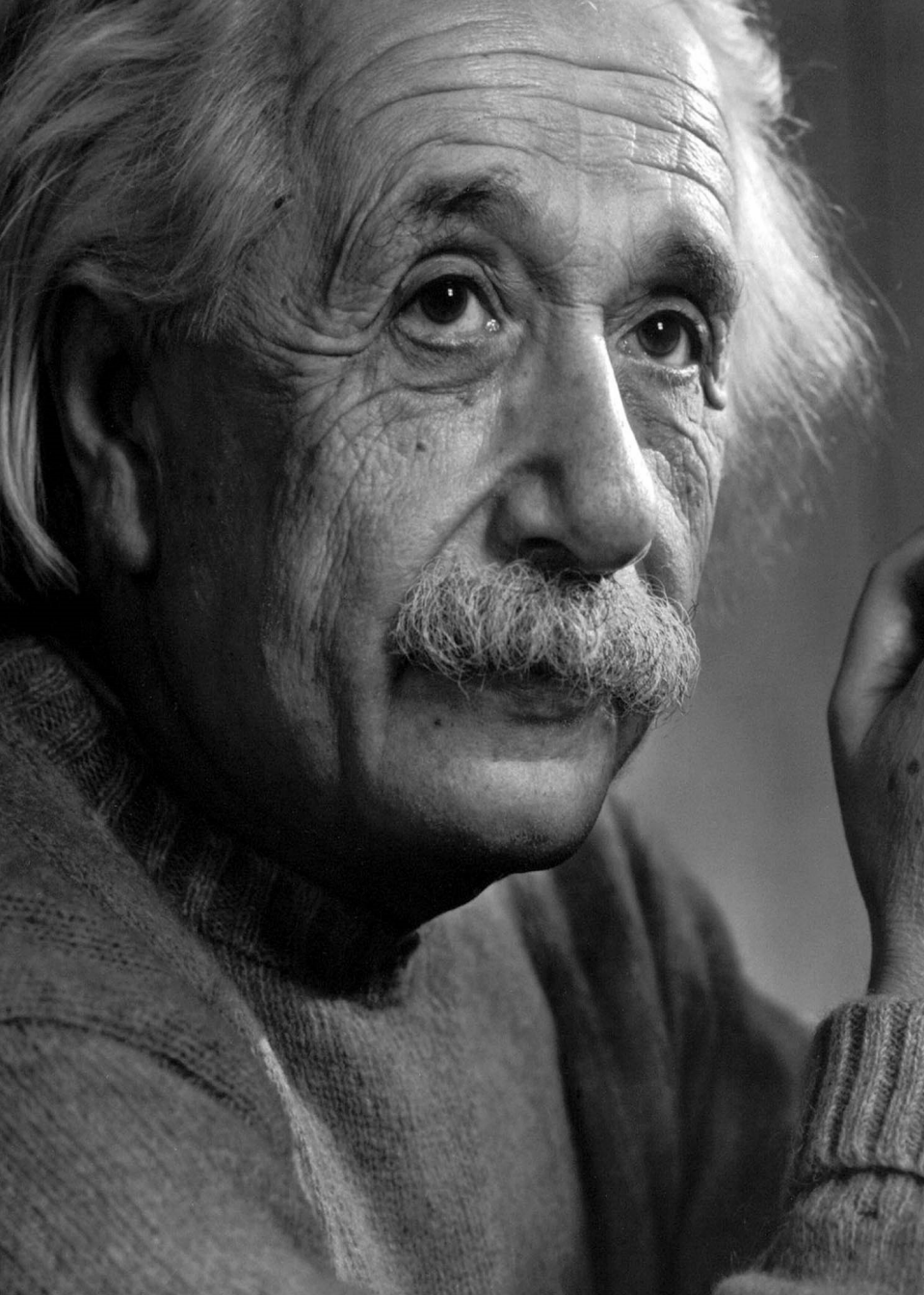

SIMONE WEIL 1909-1943

An extraordinary French philosopher and political activist. Simone took an unusual path among twentieth century left leaning intellectuals by embracing mystical spirituality. Despite her poor health, she spent long periods of time working as a factory laborer so she could better understand the plight of the working class.

Simone is an example of Enneagram Five vulnerability through her willingness to expose her own personal doubts as she searched for perennial Wisdom.

ALBERT EINSTEIN 1879-1955

Einstein's intellectual achievements and originality have made the word "Einstein" synonymous with "genius". He developed the general theory of relativity, one of the two pillars of modern physics alongside quantum mechanics. His work is also known for its influence on the philosophy of science.

Albert Einstein is an example of what happens when a healthy Five follows the pursuit of knowledge while risking his theories and uncertainty in service to Greater "Quantum" Truth.

ROSA PARKS 1913-2005

The US Congress called Rosa "the first lady of civil rights" and "mother of the freedom movement." She was a seamstress who was arrested in 1955 in Montgomery Alabama, after refusing to obey the bus driver to give up her seat in the colored section to a white passenger, after the white section was filled.

Parks illustrates healthy Six energy by refusing to act against her conscience in spite of the price she paid by losing her job and receiving death threats for many years.

"At the time my only concern was to get home after a hard day's work."

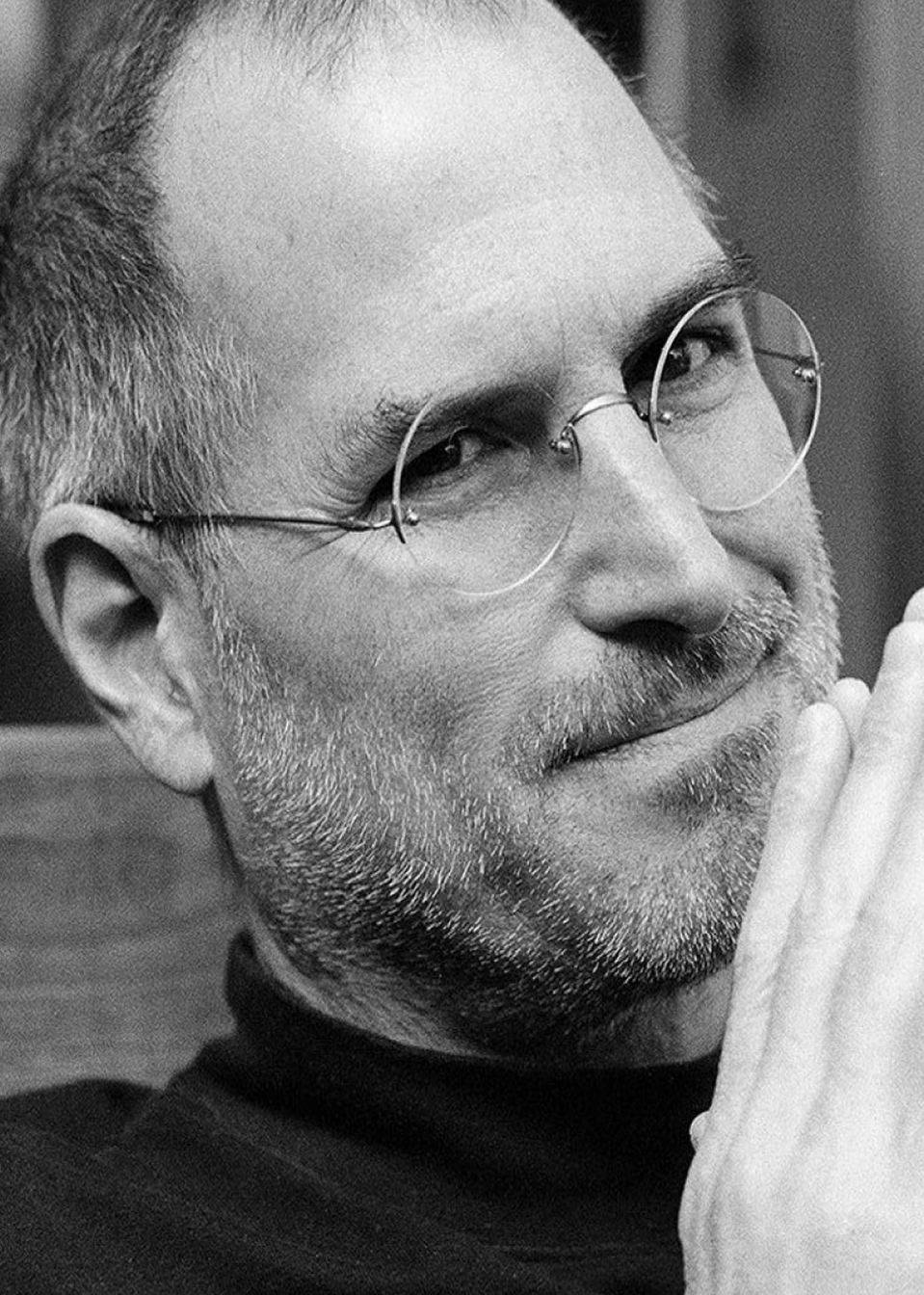
MOSES 1393-1273 BCE

Legendary prophet for the Abrahamic traditions Moses was a former Egyptian prince who later in life became a religious revolutionary to whom the authorship of the Hebrew Torah is attributed. Moses was born in a time when his people, the Israelites, were an enslaved minority and led their exodus out of Egypt.

Moses considered himself an inadequate leader who spoke with a stutter but faced his fears when standing up against the authority of both the Pharaoh and the bitter complaints of his own people.

MARY MAGDALENE 1ST CENT. AD

Mary of Magdala travelled with Jesus as one of his followers and is named in the bible more than most of the apostles. Later stories claiming she was a repentant prostitute or loose woman are not supported by the gospels. The early Church considered her on a par with St. Peter and called her the 'Apostle to the Apostles.'

Tradition says that Mary dealt with seven personal demons against which Jesus claims, "To the one who has been forgiven much, greater love is expected."

"The apostles concluded: Clearly he loved her more than us..."
(Gospel according to Mary Magdalene)

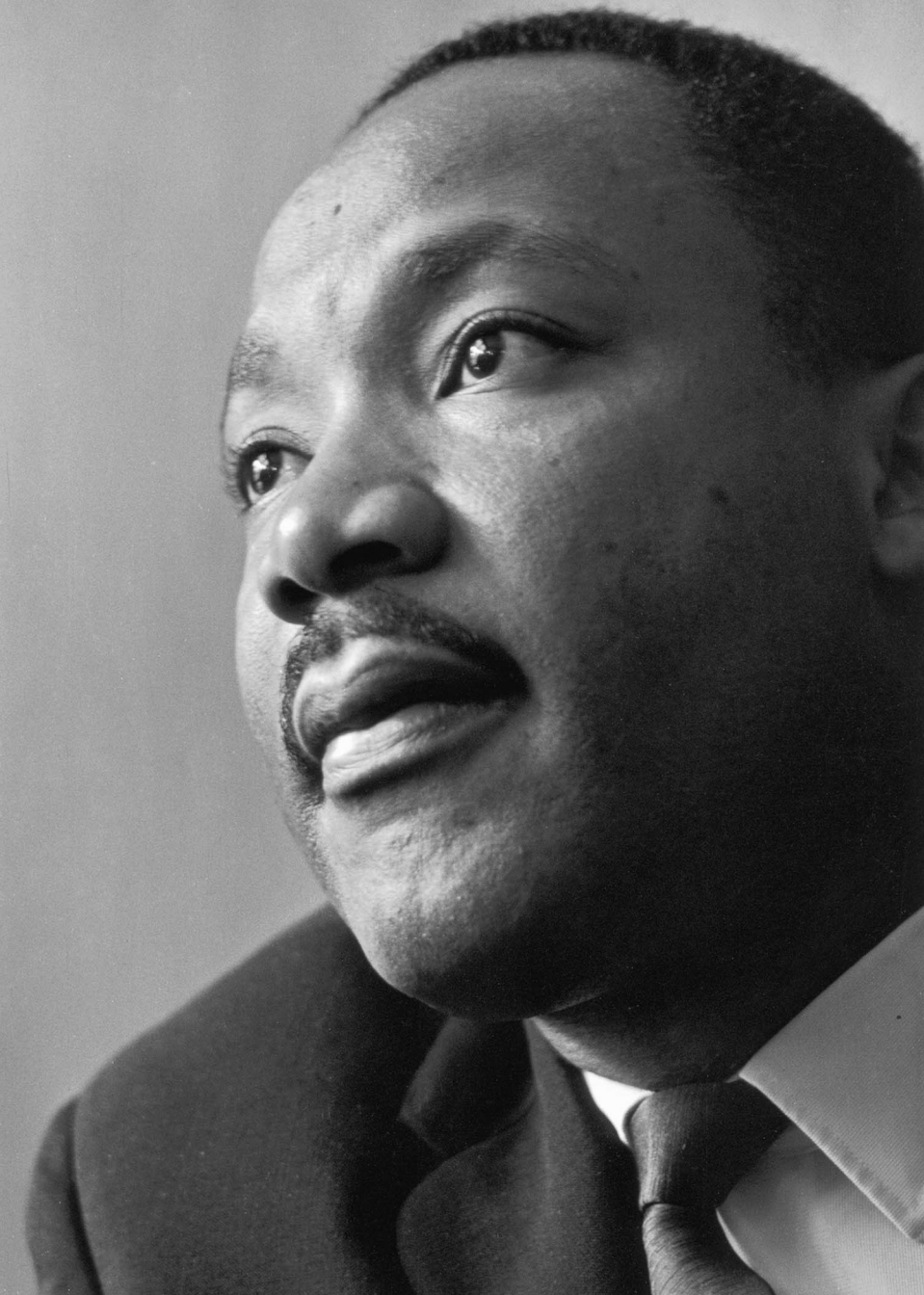
STEVE JOBS 1955-2011

An American pioneer of the 1970's computer revolution whose drive and passion for perfection revolutionized six industries: personal computers, animated movies, music, phones, tablet computing, and digital publishing. His insecurity and emotional turmoil also set him on a search for spiritual meaning.

Jobs seemed bigger than life and his inner journey was equally impressive. Leaning into the pain of his terminal cancer diagnosis Steve offered perspectives on suffering that have become part of his legacy.

MOTHER TERESA 1910-1997

Founder of the Missionaries of Charity, she lived most of her life in India but inspired a world-wide movement of advocacy for the poorest of the poor in over 150 countries running hospices and homes for people with HIV/AIDS, leprosy, tuberculosis and orphans. In 1993 she was honored as Blessed Teresa of Calcutta.

Her reputation as a strong, controversial woman and fierce advocate is testimony to Mother Teresa's transformed Eight Energy. The government of India called her a Tiger Mother on behalf of the world's poor.

"One must really have suffered oneself in order to help others."

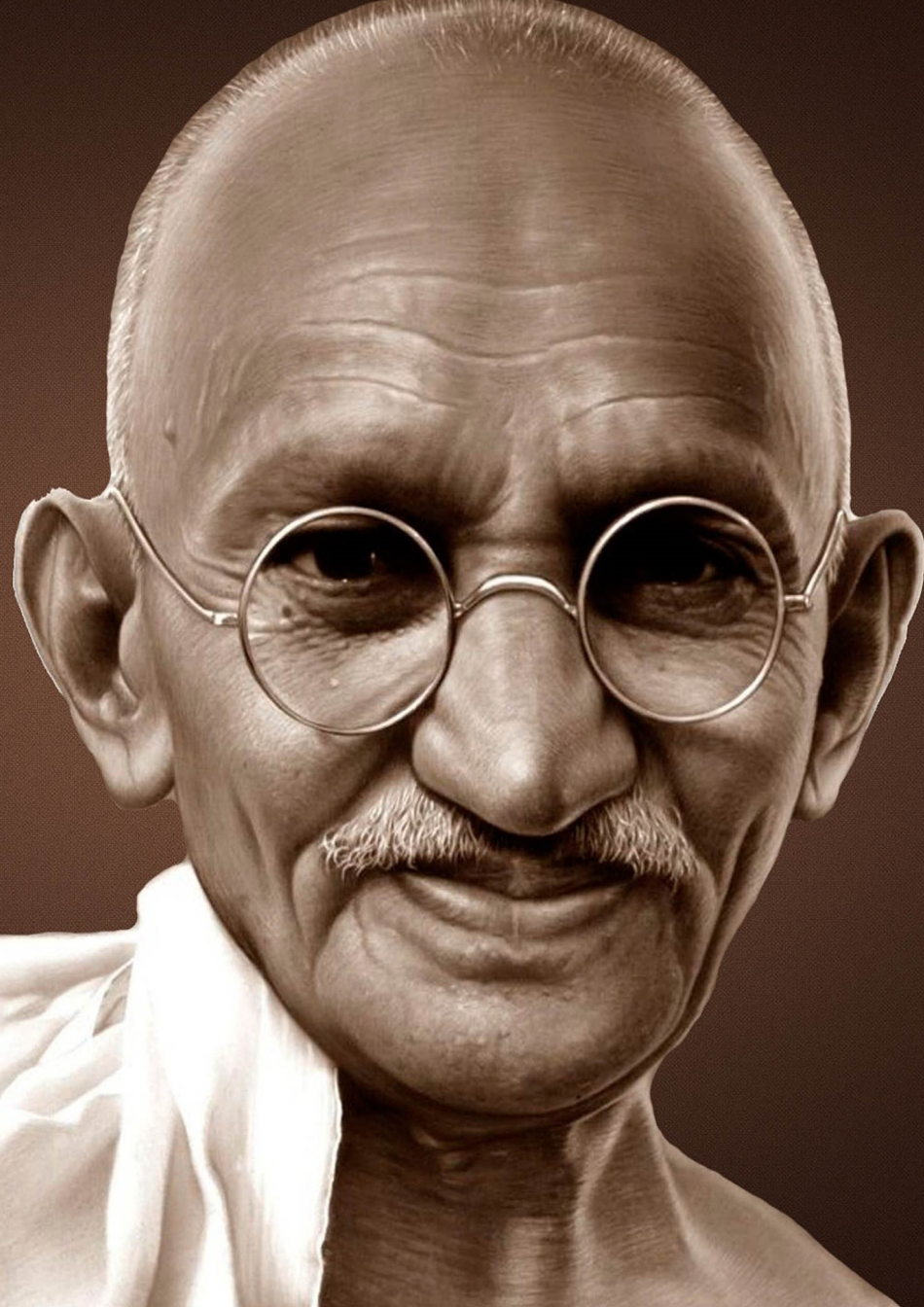
MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. 1929-1968

American Baptist minister, humanitarian, and leader in the African-American Civil Rights Movement. Profoundly influenced by Gandhi, he is best known for his role in using nonviolent disobedience based on his religious beliefs. He was assassinated on April 4 in Memphis, Tennessee.

King lived at a pivotal time and used his powerful Eight energy to inspire the nation and world in challenging racial injustice through non-violent means.

MOTHER EVE

The first mother, Eve is an archetype of the maternal soul that gives birth to the endless generations of life. Holding a pomegranate, the Middle Eastern symbol of love and heart, Eve is a wise Grandmother caring and protecting all her children equally—not just human but in every form of life.

The highest form of Nine Energy transcends self-interest and invests itself with unconditional love and compassion. Whenever the Earth is in danger, Mother Eve demands compassion in place of conflict.

GANDHI 1869-1948

Widely considered the father of India, Gandhi led the Indian independence movement in British-ruled India insisting on nonviolent civil disobedience. His life inspired movements for civil rights and freedom across the world. A Hindu nationalist assassinated him in 1948 by firing three bullets into his chest at point-blank range.

Gandhi's life is synonymous with pacifism exemplifying redeemed Nine Energy by campaigning to ease poverty, expand women's rights, building religious tolerance and ending India's scourge of untouchability.
